

## Child & Family Services - Background

Child and Family Services in BC are:

- Guided by legislation including the *Child,*Family and Community Services Act and the
  Adoptions Act
- Delivered by MCFD, Indigenous Child and Family Service agencies, and community-based service providers



### Child & Family Services – Current State

- The current system is colonial and a perpetuates a legacy of racism
- Oriented towards removing children from their family, culture and communities
- Acts like prevention and family supports are 'nice to haves' rather than the true foundation of our work
- Does not uphold the individual and collective rights of Indigenous people
- Does not make space for the multi-jurisdictional model where Indigenous Peoples exercise their pre-existing and inherent right to exercise jurisdiction over child and family services for their citizens


