Case study: Carla must choose between food or family

Last year, Carla gave up her bus pass so she could get the full increase to her provincial disability benefits. But now she doesn't get out as much and feels isolated. Some of her younger friends have found rewarding part-time work but Carla hasn't. She still relies on money from her children to pay for her groceries and rent (and her rent is almost the full amount of her monthly benefit). As a result, her kids rarely have enough spare cash to afford to visit Carla. But Carla's biggest worry is that, at this rate, her kids will be forced to give up on their own dreams in order to care for their mother.

Why these issues matter

Poverty is unavoidable for many of the people of BC with disabilities. In a province where the average rent for a 1-bedroom apartment is \$1,054,6 the maximum disability payment for a single person is only \$983.42.3 That's not good enough. The number of unpaid senior citizen caregivers looking after their adult children with disabilities is greater than the populations of Prince Rupert and Nelson combined. The people of BC deserve better.

Raising awareness about these issues

- The average payment for a single person with disabilities is \$983.42 a month (including the max shelter rate and transportation allowance).³
- In the next five years, Community Living BC expects the number of people aged 45 to 64 using its funded services to increase by 14 percent.³
- There are currently over 100,000 British Columbians on disability assistance but only a portion of those get the full amount.²
